Heritage Open Days 8th – 11th September 2016

Thousands of buildings and places across England will be throwing their doors open to the public for four days again in September, for an annual celebration of architecture, history and culture. For this year's festival, Heritage Open Days have joined forces with the Central Council of Church Bell Ringers to open up the heritage treasure hidden inside England's bell towers and bring to life the 400 year old tradition of English-style bell ringing.

The added challenge is to open up **500** bell towers across the country to the public, offering special bell ringing demonstrations at some point during the week-end. In addition, Heritage Open Days are hoping to create a collective bell ringing moment during the festival on Thursday 8th September 6.00 – 7.00pm.

If you haven't already heard about this then it's probably too late to take part officially this year as bell towers need to register with Heritage Open Days by 1st August 2016. However there's no reason why you shouldn't join in unofficially and/or ring with everyone else on Thursday 8th September or visit some of the towers that are participating. They'll be listed on the Heritage Open Days website (Visiting) and can be searched by town, county or local authority.

Walk and Ring at Graffham 11th June

This year Christine Butterfield had decided to organise her annual event on 11th June so that we started the ringing at 5.00pm at Graffham Church and after an amble through the local footpaths, we would finish at the same place. A supper would then follow at the local pub.

The weather, so good the previous week, had turned a bit damp, but 15 or so turned up, much to Christine's relief, as the initial response had been a little slow. Graffham is tucked away just north of the Downs and south of Midhurst so took a bit of finding but a good group had gathered by the church for ringing when I arrived.

Some of us had also rung ¼ peals already for the Queens 90th birthday (Moya even two ¼ peals!) and Jack organised the ringing on the lovely 6 bells at St Giles before the walk. We rang some Cambridge, Reverse Canterbury, Grandsire and Bob Minor. Thanks George for the use of the bells which we all enjoyed especially the ground floor ringing and lovely setting.



At 6.45 we rang down and gathered outside where others joined us for the walk which headed east through the grounds of Seaford College. With the heavily wooded Downs to the right and the lush fields of Lavenham Stud to the left, it was a delightful way to wind down and enjoy the views. No little brown dog this year to keep us amused but the path was well paved and level and the rain held off. To most people's surprise, a new housing development appeared just before Seaford College buildings. 18 high quality 2,3,4 and 5 bedroom properties designed by Neil Holland of Arundel had been recently completed and all sold (I assume they must have been given consent before the area became a National Park) A useful money spinner to help the College build their new sports centre, I guess.

A left turn through the development found us heading for the green, green grass of the stud farm and the occasional mare and foal where cameras were brought out for horsey selfies! Another left turn and fence styles had to be elegantly negotiated before we met a small herd of friendly calves for a nose patting session. On past the village cricket ground where Jacks' car was available to pick up the stragglers before another left turn and grind away up a slight hill to the church. Graham Hills joined us here following a rather trying day which involved suffering the services of Southern Rail travelling from London after a day of Central Council meetings – real stamina!

Petworth/Tillington Get Together Practice

This month's meet was at Petworth, St Mary, 8 Bells Tenor: 18-0-9 (919kg) in E

The church has a peal of eight bells, tuned to a diatonic scale in the key of E. The heaviest, or tenor, bell weighs 18cwt (900kg). The bells were cast in 1924 by Gillett & Johnson at the Croydon bell foundry, replacing an earlier peal cast in 1827 by Thomas Mears of Whitechapel, London. The assembled band of 18, under the careful organisation of Chris Fynes who ensured that seasoned veterans and beginners alike all or so enjoyed ringing these lovely bells. Graham Hill's patient occasional coaching for those uncertain of their direction in methods on 8 was most appreciated. We were visited by Martin Waldron who lives in Hampshire and used to be a bell hanger at Whitechapel Bell Foundry. David Kirkcaldy knows him via a mutual friend who also used to work there but is now a priest. Martin is no longer a bell ringer but heard the bells and climbed the stairs to say hello.

The church of St Mary stands just outside the grounds of Petworth House. The church is mentioned in the Domesday Book but most of the building dates from the C13th and C14th. Restorations in 1827 and 1903 have hidden much of the old structure. The steeple had an unfortunate history and was finally removed in 1947 and the rendering removed from the tower. A display showed how renovations had brought light and space into the church. The ceiling of the church is of a beautiful domed Victorian wagon design.



We retired for team after ringing into the wooden panelled church next to a small kitchen where tables were laid out and festooned with a variety of tasty sandwiches savouries and cakes. We have Suzanne Thompson, Linda Wort, Barbara Neighbour, Sally Reay and Lucy Wentworth to thank for the wonderful tea.

David Kirkcaldy took the opportunity to speak about the Heritage Open Days promotion of Challenge 500, which is an opportunity for towers to open their doors and raise the profile of Bell ringing. Towers who register will benefit from publicity materials, press involvement and listing on the website for visitors to search for places participating the weekend 8-11 September 2016. There were a number of flyers and press releases that I had taken along. Next year we shall start our promotion of this event in May in order to be included in the launch earlier in the year!

After the raffle organised by Juliet Fynes which had amongst its many prizes a fruit basket, vodka, fresh free range eggs and other delightful essentials, we helped clear away and 11 ringers drove to TILLINGTON, ALL HALLOWS a short distance westward along the A272.

A stone church was built on this site in the 1180's and some of it remains today in the south aisle. The font dates from the 12th century. Over the centuries many amendments and changes were made to the building but the ones that are most in evidence now, began with Lord Egremont's (of Petworth House) construction of a new bell tower with its distinctive "Scot's Crown" in 1807 which features in paintings by JMW Turner and John Constable.



Our respected seasoned ringers began to have some fun challenging each other to interesting methods on the five bells and we were treated to Reverse St Bartholomew, Steadman Minimus, St Simon's, Reverse Canterbury as well as Grandsire Doubles too of course! Petworth and Tillington bell ringers work together to ensure as much as possible that ringing continues at both towers, but as in many other areas, find it increasingly difficult with people moving away and getting on – a refrain heard in too many places. Let's hope we can turn it round with all these wonderful Young Ringers coming through nowadays!

Andrew Davison Barnsdale 12th May 1949 – 20th March 2016



In south west Surrey there is a small village called Dockenfield. It was at Manor Farm that Andrew was born on 12th May 1949. His early life is somewhat a mystery but it was in 1977 that Andrew was encouraged by Dennis Shephard to go along to Frensham church to find out more about bell ringing. He was taught the art by Clifford Beadle and Andrew became a member of the Guildford Guild that same year. He progressed quickly and was ringing regularly at Frensham and with the strong band at Binsted, where he was a tower member from 1979 until 1988. He was keen to take on active roles in the tower and was steeple keeper at Frensham until his move to the outskirts of Haslemere.

His ringing progressed rapidly and he was soon ringing on higher numbers. He started attending practices with the College Youths and was elected to the Society in 1981, he was proposed by Brian Underwood and seconded by Terry Collins. In 1985, after a very short 4 years, he was elected Junior Steward of the College Youths and in due course went on to be master. He was also a very active member of the Liss Campanile Youths, ringing on the 12 'ceramic bells' in Liss. Ringing was always conducted to a high standard and Andrew was a member of the band who entered the National 12 Bell Striking Competition in 1986. The band convincingly won the eliminator at Painswick, and was only very narrowly beaten into second place by the

College Youths in the final. The following year he left the LCY as he felt a conflict with being Master of the College Youths.

Andrew married Anne Pyner in August 1986. The ceremony took place at Frensham, a very important place in Andrew's life. They soon had children, Amy and Lucie, and in August 2000 Grace was born. As with many ringers when children arrive, peals dropped off in their frequency, ringing only a handful a year up until 2010 when numbers started to increase again.

Ancient and noble arts featured heavily throughout his life. He was extremely involved in archery.

The Barnsdale family, Andrew and his mother and father were strongly associated with archery. Andrew would have grown up with archery as a theme in his life. Angela Barnsdale was well known in the world of archery and painted pictures which were observations of the characters in archery at the time. He was particularly fond of shooting the traditional English longbow and would shoot these while most others were using the modern equivalents. He also preferred to shoot in a traditional shooting coat, a bit like morning dress but in a heavy green cloth and slouch hat with the side pinned up. He stood out from the crowd. He was a member of some of the ancient archery organisations, including the Worshipful Company of Bowyers. Even so ringing could get in the way of his archery. At a Grand National Archery

meeting at Worcester College, Oxford, he was part way through a competition and put his bow down and said 'Sorry chaps, I have to go and ring a peal in London now'.

As with his ringing his working life was spent helping young people learn and progress. He taught Economics at the University of Surrey in Guildford, where his colleagues had a high regard for his seemingly laid back attitude, his love of coffee brewed in his own special way and rapport with the students.

While he enjoyed peals, he was very much of the view that ringing for Sunday services and weddings was extremely important. He was looking after the 3 bells at Fernhurst and would make sure anyone who wanted bells for their wedding would get them, and he would always be one of the three required. Never one to shirk responsibility, Andrew served on the Central Council as a rep for the Sussex County Association and served on the methods committee. He was also instrumental in getting the Council to include peals rung on dumbbells in their statistics.

His association with Frensham continued when his daughter Amy was married there in 2014. Andrew conducted a quarter peal of Plain Bob Minor on the day following the ceremony.

In all, Andrew rang 516 peals, including 1 on handbells. His first at Frensham of Plain Bob Major in 1978, conducted by John Couperthwaite, and his last Glasgow Surprise Major in 2015 at St Agatha, Portsmouth. His association with the College Youths continued, he attended most (if not all) annual dinners and never missed a Past Master lunch.

During his final illness Andrew, who had a very strong faith, remained positive and cheerful, even ringing handbells with friends, in what must have been a very testing time for him. He died, fittingly, on the day of the 2016 Past Masters Lunch. He will be very much missed by all who knew him.
