## **Castle Christmas Ringing 2023**

It is unusual for a ringing session to take place in a castle but at Arundel, it had been the custom for the three bells inside their mini-tower, to have their dust shaken off with a pre-Christmas ring. That is until 2019 when I had a chance to inspect them and condemn them as unsafe. They were always a difficult set, cast in 1898, which tended to drop on you (debris as well as ropes!) and the sallies were positioned close into each of the corners of an eight foot square chamber.

With the intervention of the covid pandemic it has taken a while for any action but happily they have now been much improved with a new steel frame, headstocks, sliders, bearings and floor. We were then asked if we could provide ringers for this year's Mass to take place in the castle private chapel for 2023.

It was a chilly evening on 13<sup>th</sup> December as Colin and Sue Spencer and myself waited outside the huge castle gates for Sylvia Hartigan to make up our band (always have a spare just in case!). The gates opened and inside was a motorised buggy to run us through the grounds. Deciding not to wait for Sylvia as time was getting on, we climbed aboard and chugged off following the low-level lighting posts. A winding route brought us out into the internal court of the castle, all lit up, and we were dropped by the door where a "footman" showed us into the hall. It was strangely devoid of the festive decorations usually draped over the stuffed bulls' heads and armour but a warming fire in the grate was welcoming. Eventually Sylvia arrived (she had a long walk!) and we made our way up the stone stair and corridor towards the old keep. From this corridor another short stair brought us to the ringing chamber.

We were glad to see a small electric heater but puzzled by the batch of large, yellow ear defenders! Ringing up the treble soon showed us why. The sound was deafening as there was no hatch between us and the bells just above us! Following a minor struggle fitting our ears with muffles, we started on rounds, looking like cartoon characters. Calling was impossible as nobody could hear so we stood the bells and agreed to try plain hunt with commands actuated by stamping one foot or the other!

It didn't sound too bad and the ropes were a huge improvement on the old layout. We swapped bells and tried again then finished with rounds so that we all had a try of each. After ringing down we took photos, turned off the heater and lights and quietly made our way out to the waiting buggy. It was a little disappointing this year as we would have normally been directed after ringing to the great hall where, in times before, a huge Christmas tree, roaring log fire and mulled wine with vol-au-vents would have greeted us but perhaps so much was spent on the bells even castles have had to tighten their belts.

Sylvia and I had a standby however as the vicar of St Nicholas Church had invited us to drop in to his Advent Party only about 100 yards away! Another eventful evening for all four of us which had only happened because of bell-ringing. You never know where it may lead you!



## Remembrance Ringing 11<sup>th</sup> November 2023 Aldwick

The monthly get together coincided with Remembrance Day so we were able to ring half-muffled on the 8 bells at Aldwick. There was a very good turnout – 30 ringers aged between 11 and 85+ arrived at St Richard's but no problem as this church has all the accoutrements a district ring might need – large car-park, well behaved bells, meeting hall with full facilities and just about enough room in the ringing chamber to fit us all in.



The church was built in 1933-4 to serve the newly developed Aldwick Estate and was the last stone-built church in Sussex. It seems to have been a Mosse family project: the Rev CH Mosse was appointed minister in 1931 when there was only a temporary chapel. His father HR Mosse, a retired doctor from South London and historian of Sussex church monuments, sponsored the building of a new church at a cost of £15,000 and happily FG Troup, HR Mosse's son-in-law, was available to be employed as architect.

Apparently the church tower was designed to take 8 bells but only the current no. 6 was installed in 1933. After Rev Mosse retired two more bells were installed in1958 in memory of

his wife and father. More bells were added over the years and the last two needed to complete the project in September 2007. The local paper reported

Earlier this month the two extra bells for St Richard's Church were finally brought to the church and blessed in a service led by Bishop Roger Jupp.

As is traditional, incense was burned inside both to make them sound sweeter. After the service, the bells were raised into the bell tower for hanging with the other six, and for the new ropes to be fitted to all eight. They will be rung for the first time on Sunday, September 23, with a hopeful first quarter peal rung on Thursday

I haven't been able to find evidence of this quarter peal (can anyone remember?) but Bellboard does record the first Peal on the 8 bells: Yorkshire Surprise Major, 2<sup>nd</sup> February 2008 and the band comprised: Alan Martin, Keith Game, Ruth Reeves, Hamish McNaughton, Philip Stevens, Mike Wake, Ian Hastilow and Colin Spencer.

David Kirkcaldy was responsible for crowd control and he did a great job keeping the ringing moving incorporating everything from rounds & call changes to Cambridge Major and making sure that everyone got several gos.

We all had a very enjoyable afternoon. The Bell Restoration Fund had a good time too gaining £108 from both the teas collection and raffle. Many thanks to Liz and Jonathon and to all those who baked.

# CCCBR UPDATE February 2024

The largest section of work is surrounding the 'Ringing 2030' project; this is looking at trying to ensure that ringing has a viable future. One point is that given current trends the ringing population is becoming more mature; on the other hand, it is worth bearing in mind a large proportion of those who will be ringing in 2030 have yet to start ringing.

# BELL RINGERS

Ringing 2030 has three pillars on which it is based:

<u>Publicity and marketing</u>: Raise awareness of the art of bellringing and promote it as a social and voluntary activity. Drive new recruits to us with better targeted marketing initiatives.

<u>Recruitment and development</u>: Encourage the development of local and regional structures to recruit potential new ringers and attract lapsed ringers back to ringing, then ensure their expectations are met as they progress

<u>Quality environment</u>: Teachers, teaching structures, leadership, bell installations, ringing environments, safeguarding, etc. We have to create a quality environment that makes people enjoy ringing and want to stay doing it.

The Sussex County Association supports this project going forward and we have already commenced seeking the view of members as to what is required at a local level.

In addition, there is other work going on in the main to support the 'Ringing 2030' project. What was initially called the mobile belfry, now The Touring Tower, will hopefully be completed later this year and it will be operated from a trust that will also manage two other mobile belfries.

A ringing centre is being developed in Northampton. This was initially hoped to be a national ringing centre but due to changing demands from the Churches Conservation Trust, who own the land, it may end up being scaled back to more of a regional centre.

The organisation of Central Council publications is being reviewed.

New publicity material has been produced and this is available free to use via a link on the CCCBR website. https://cccbr.org.uk/resources/publicity-material/

Consideration is being given to the question should bell ringing be an intangible cultural heritage. A consultation is being carried out, and you can find out more by using this link. <u>https://cccbr.org.uk/2024/01/18/what-is-intangible-cultural-heritage-and-why-does-it-matter-to-bellringing/</u>

Bell ringers are being encouraged to join in the 'Ring out for Peace' project to mark the 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary of D-Day in June. Also, this year there is a national push to encourage individual churches to get involved on 'Bell Sunday'; this is scheduled to take place on Sunday 12 May.

Lastly, there are concerns about volunteer burnout, too few people taking on too much work. This is as true in Sussex as anywhere else in the country. So do please get involved with ringing at whatever level: tower, district or county. Don't worry if you are a new recruit you will bring with you skills to help. Hopefully you enjoy your ringing so help spread the message and encourage those who may be a few steps behind you in their progress.
